Winter Survival Kit

Pack a winter survival kit to keep in your vehicle. Suggested items include:

- Jumper cables
- Blankets
- Candles/matches
- Water
- Extra clothing/boots
- Snow shovel/ice scraper
- High-calorie, non-perishable foods
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- First-aid kit
- · Strips of carpet for traction

Winter Driving: Tips for Teens

Winter driving can be stressful for the most experienced drivers, but with guidance and practice, we can prepare our teens to feel more confident behind-the-wheel during the winter season.

Discuss Winter Driving Basics

- Stress the value of checking the forecast and road conditions before leaving. Will they need more time to travel? Is the weather bad enough to stay home?
- Remind students on driving basics like slowing down when roads are slippery (visibility could be limited) and leaving extra space between your car and the vehicle ahead.
- Watch out for snowplows! "Please remember that snowplows are generally driving much slower than people expect and be mindful to give us extra room while we are working to clear the way for you," says Jason Fisher, Maintenance Training Coordinator for the Iowa DOT.
- Check the gas gauge before every trip. Is there enough fuel to reach their destination? Do they have a winter car kit?

Practice, Practice, Practice

Teach students to defrost windows and how to check their vehicle for things like:

- Tire tread and pressure.
- Fluid levels (coolant and washer fluid).
- Ensure battery is charged.
- Replace worn wiper blades.
- Make sure all lights are working.

Emphasize the need to leave extra space between the car ahead.

Winter Driving Tips from the Iowa State Patrol

The <u>lowa State Patrol</u> recommends these tips when traveling on roadways when winter weather conditions may be present:

- Keep windshields clear Scrape snow and ice to ensure full visibility.
- Increase following distance Allow five to six seconds of time between you and the vehicle you're following, especially snowplows.
- Be patient Allow more time, and daylight when possible, to get to your destination. Remember that detouring through a median can cause problems.
- Always pay attention to the road Traffic flow can change in an instant, and braking times increase dramatically with snow or ice.
- Add braking time to exit freeways and interstates Exits and overpasses get slick during winter events and require even more braking time.
- Know when to skip cruise control Don't use cruise control on snow and ice.
- Prepare a winter survival kit A winter survival kit will help you endure an emergency or road closure until help arrives.
- Turn on headlights It's critical to be seen on snowy and foggy days.
- Stay up to date on weather, road conditions, and closures Before you head out, check live road conditions, closures, and more at 511ia.org.
